This week I have had the pleasure of visiting classrooms across the school. I have mainly visited the lessons of new teachers. What I see are very capable teachers providing well-thought-out lessons in which students are engaged. The more I see, the more I am happy that we have solid teachers. You can go a long way when you have capable teachers.

It was great to see teachers using the technology of Google Classroom to provide feedback to students on assignments; it was great to see how our new teachers have already formed good relations with students and how this translates into confidence in students to ask and answer questions in class. It was amazing to see how well-planned teachers were in providing differentiated lessons to include all the learners in their classes. I loved the way one teacher asked – 'So, how does this relate to life in the UAE?' Another asked learners to use the vocabulary they had learnt to describe their experience of life in the UAE.

It might be obvious to understand why a principal would be happy with all this but the last point about the UAE may need a little explanation. Of course, it is a requirement that we relate the curriculum to life in the UAE. Teachers sometimes add something about the UAE in a question or relate what has been learnt to the UAE themselves however in the two examples above the teachers went further – they went from 'providing an education' to 'providing an opportunity for young people to take their education'. There's a difference and it's big.

When we 'provide' an education by having students attend school, comply with the rules and routines and listen to the teacher so they learn what they are told in order to pass tests we end up with failure for some and a fragile success for others. However, when we provide the opportunity for young people to take their education, we are opening the door for success for all. If our children know that education belongs to them – that it is not for a teacher to give but for them to take, create, pursue, etc then school becomes a very different place. It becomes a place where young people go to grow, develop, learn and apply themselves. They learn how to learn and learn how to develop – to make mistakes and grow from them and to do that both as individuals and collaboratively.

So, when a teacher asks – 'How does what we're doing in class relate to the UAE?' they are providing an opportunity for engagement – for young people to think, wonder, make connections, reflect, discuss and research. They also provide an opportunity for entrepreneurial spirit to develop – and the more opportunities there are, the easier it is for young people to notice and take them. The more they do that the easier it is to have them create opportunities for themselves.

I started this week with a training session from ADEK that I thought might be long and dull but proved to be the opposite – it was all about preparing students for PISA assessments – another assessment?! – however, it turned out to be a very different sort of preparation and one that we shall pursue because it left the door open for schools to build in rich learning opportunities for our learners and teachers.

This week we had Mr. Sliman lead two assemblies, the first one being an assembly about creativity and the second one being about managing stress which I am sure we can all relate to.

Here are a few tips in helping your children manage stress:

1. Encourage Open Communication

- Create a Safe Space: Make sure children feel comfortable talking about their feelings. Encourage them to share their thoughts, fears, and concerns without fear of judgment.
- Listen Actively: When a child talks about their worries, listen attentively. Validate their feelings by acknowledging their emotions, saying, "I can see that you're feeling upset."
- 2. Promote Healthy Physical Activities
 - Exercise and Play: Physical activity is one of the best ways to release stress. Encourage outdoor play, sports, or even dance at home to get them moving and channel their energy.
- 3. Establish Routines
 - Consistency and Structure: Children thrive on routines. Having a regular schedule for meals, homework, and bedtime can create a sense of security and reduce stress, especially during uncertain times.
 - Break Tasks into Smaller Steps: If a child is stressed about a big task (e.g., homework or a school project), help them break it down into smaller, manageable steps.
- 4. Ensure Adequate Sleep
- Create a Bedtime Routine: A consistent and calming bedtime routine can help children wind down and improve the quality of their sleep.
 Limit Screen Time Before Bed: Reducing screen time in the evening ensures better sleep, which is crucial for managing stress.





Implementation of No ID, No Entry Policy for Parents/Visitors

Dear Parents/Guardians,

I hope this message finds you well. Effective 23rd September 2024: the ****No ID**, **No Entry**** policy is strictly and fully implemented.

This is to ensure the safety and security of all students, staff, and visitors on our school. The policy applies to both students and parents/guardians, and it requires everyone entering the school premises to present a valid school ID card. Please find the details of the policy below:

For Students:

- Students must carry their school ID card at all times and present it upon entry to the school.

For Parents/Guardians:

- Parents/guardians visiting the school for any reason **must wear the parent badge** issued to them by the school upon entry and whenever they are in school premises, also present a valid parent ID or visitor pass at the entrance.

- School may refuse entry to any visitors and parents who do not comply with the **NO ID, No Entry** policy requirements specially during dismissal.

How to Obtain IDs:

- If your child has misplaced their school ID, please contact the school administration for a replacement. Lost IDs will be charged for reprinting. Again, it's not about the "charge or the money", it's about "RESPONSIBILITY".

- If you need to obtain a parent/visitor ID, kindly visit the school office during business hours to have one issued.
