#### What Makes a Great School?

I often hear educators, writers, and presenters asking the question, 'What do you remember from school?' They then go on to talk about great teachers they had and how one teacher, in particular, inspired them and changed their lives. When I hear this, I feel a bit sad. 'One teacher that made the difference?' Of course, that was the teacher who stuck in their mind – I am sure if they really thought about it, they would remember and recognise other teachers, other members of staff, and visitors to the school who contributed to that difference. How about you? Who do you remember from school (or if you are a student reading this, who will you remember)? Activity: If you are a parent or a teacher, why not discuss with your young people or person, what they think they might remember from school in ten- or twentyyears' time?

I recently read the book Dare to Be Different by Will Ryan (2019). In that book, the author talks about second and third-generational lessons. These lessons are the ones that you tell your children about and the ones that your parents tell your children about. Think about it – do you ever say to your children, 'I remember when I was at school and we had this one lesson, I'll never forget it, but the teacher said ... .etc'? Or perhaps it was a 'lesson' given by your parents (or their parents or relatives) – 'My mother always said...', or 'I remember when Uncle Fareed once taught us how to make a fire.'

What lessons will your children tell their children and their grandchildren? Can you imagine them saying: 'I remember the lesson where we sat staring at the board while the teacher explained something that I couldn't relate to, but we were told that it was in the test? It was great.' I don't think so. I asked a few of your young people this week, 'What do you like about school?' Some mentioned the nice teachers, but others spoke about meeting their friends, and one or two, sadly, said they didn't like school.

Why can't more lessons be second-generation lessons – the ones your children tell their children why can't they be third-generation lessons – the ones they are still talking about when they have grandchildren? For that matter, why can't every day hold an experience that's memorable – the interaction I saw yesterday when a member of the finance department spent time consoling an upset child by listening to her and making her laugh or the opportunity given to our learners this week to play in a football tournament or visit a model racing event or to address or perform to the school community?

I think it is not too much to aim for something special occurring every day for our young people. For that to happen, the discovery and creation of those opportunities would have to come from us all – teachers, staff, parents, but most importantly from our young people. If we ensure they have the time, space and opportunity to contribute to creating a great learning environment in our school, then they may even grow into the sort of people our universities and employers look out for.

In the end, we want our young people to be able to say that the school I went to was special because it made me the learner for life that I am. It helped me discover and create the opportunities that led to my happiness and success.

I would also like to thank our newly formed Parents-in-Partnership group for doing an amazing job assisting with our celebrations for Eid Al-Etihad.








Dear students and parents, we have an exciting announcement!
