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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE - MY IDENTITY

This is not an article about my identity, but more about who our children are and who they are becoming (and how ADEK and school policy help with that).

I have worked on many school inspections, accreditations, and authorisations for international schools, and one question I always like to ask is, 'If you took this school and moved it to another country, what would change as a result of leaving here?" What this question is really asking is, 'What effect does the local community and culture have on our school and the experience our young people have from attending it?' Perhaps that doesn't grab you? Another perspective on this is, 'As your child grows here, to what extent are they affected by the community and culture around them?"

How are we affected in our daily lives from living in a relatively safe, multi-cultural, secure, fast-growing, affluent economy? To what extent does the history and the future of this country affect our young people? To what extent do local beliefs and customs affect foreigners who are born here, foreigners who have been here for a long time and those who are just short-term residents?

Learning from the Future: Did you know that the UAE has a 'We the UAE 2031' vision? Did you know that there's a 'UAE Future Roadmap'? To build the future of the UAE, our young people will need certain fundamental skills and dispositions - compassion, respect, global understanding, the power to communicate well, collaborate and to be creative, innovative and entrepreneurial, to be able to grow from difficulties, care enough to be determined, and proactive. These are the attributes that we can help young people develop at school and home.

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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE - MY IDENTITY

Then there's trust. In most British, American, International (etc) schools around the world, parents worry that their children will lose their national identity. You place your local children in such a school, and so there may be, later, aspects of their development that you don't recognise. Of course, to a great extent, that happens with teenagers as they often have a different culture from adults, but do locals and expats in our community fear sending their children to Belvedere in case they lose their culture? How do you deal with the question of your child's cultural identity?

Of course, attentive to detail as they are, the UAE authorities, through ADEK, help us address these questions through a programme called 'My Identity'. We at school must pay attention to the above questions. However, as a learning community, it is vital that we have parent support with this. So here are some questions that we wonder if you know the answer to (as residents and citizens of Abu Dhabi) and if your children know (And if they don't, perhaps you can find out together...)

What are Emirati values, and how do they compare to those of others? Actually, if you use an AI bot, it is quite interesting to ask this: 'Compare the similarities and differences between UAE national values and those of (Jordan/India/Pakistan/Iraq/ Nigeria/etc).

How, why, and when did the Emirates become united? What roles does it play in the world? What lessons about collaboration, trust, respect and compassion can we learn from this?



How does what we learn at school connect with where we live?

- Connections to the past in the present: Local customs and culture.
- Connection to the present: What the UAE does industry, trade, etc
- Connection to the future: What are the aims and goals of We the UAE 2031 and Pathway

Do you know how life here affects you? What positive things are you learning from being in Abu Dhabi? What positive attitudes are you able to develop here that would have been more difficult elsewhere?

And finally, there is the question (one that in many countries often embarrasses me) – 'So, spending that time in the country – you must have learnt the language?'

Luckily, at Belvedere, we have a great Arabic programme for non-natives taught by wonderful teachers. Everyone who stays with us – even for a short time – should leave with at least some basic Arabic.

So, let's help our young people become more aware of their surroundings, of the past and the present and the future and how our life here influences our positive outcomes.





























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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE' WITH 'BEING PROACTIVE

Learning to Take your Education Rather than Waiting to be Given It.

I have been meeting with teenagers from Y7 and Y8 this week. They are special people in that they are the interesting ones who have all failed more than three of their subjects in Term 2.

My objective is to have them identify why they have done so poorly in their exams. I start by assuring them that they are not in trouble, that what we are doing is like a visit to the doctor and that their symptoms are poor results in their reports. The symptoms might seem bad but what's more important is that we need to find out the cause. We needed to get to the heart of the matter. I asked them, 'How did you end up with such poor results?'

Most start of by saying, 'I don't know.' A few look sad and say, 'I have to work harder.'

That's a terrible place to be some two weeks into term 3. Learners have to know what went wrong otherwise how are they going to improve? How are you going to move forward?

Young people fail at school for a number of reasons:

- Not taking school seriously, not being mature enough, not realising the consequences of procrastination.
- Not being able to focus due to negative situations at home or at school; being in love; having more interesting/relevant interests outside school.

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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE' WITH 'BEING PROACTIVE

- Not understanding what school is really for; finding school oppressive; lessons boring; teachers weird; having language difficulties that are not addressed or compensated for.
- Having missed a crucial concept; fear of high-stakes assessment; being
 perfectionist so that they spend too much of their childhood trying to do too
 much homework; being so perfectionist they can't do anything in case it's
 wrong; having parents that don't care or pass on a weak culture of learning.

Notice that none of the reasons include laziness (doesn't exist); being dumb (so few children are actually unable to learn that we probably don't have any here); 'not being language/mathematical/scientific/artistic/sporty/etc people' – at this level everyone can pass if the conditions are right.

So, what I say to such young 'failures' is at this age at least the most important thing is not their grade but their understanding of themselves and why they achieved such low grades and what their next steps might be to achieve better grades no matter what's holding them back.

We'll take a look at what these might be in the next issue (and when more learners have told me what their next steps will be)

Keep aiming high and believing in yourselves. This term is full of possibilities!






























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SCIENCE WEEK

We are so inspired by Adn's passion and creativity. Keep letting your imagination run wild, Adn — the world needs more artists like you.





























We are immensely proud of you, Malak! Your passion and perseverance are an inspiration to us all. Keep shining! 🌞📖


































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


